CENTRE CELEBRATES TENTH ANNIVERSARY

orsham Information & Heritage Centre has recently achieved 10 years of serving the public; residents and visitors alike. It opened its doors in the summer of 2000 - a fact recorded on the plaque to be found on the inside wall of the Heritage Room.

To mark the occasion, the twosome who originally opened the Centre reconvened at Arnold House on September 23rd to celebrate the event. The very same Lord Lansdowne and Roger Fido were on hand to recognise the successes of those ten years and to wish "many more" to those presently entrusted with the running of the Centre - ourselves, the CADT.

It was fitting that the Centre had just been recognised by Mystery Shoppers from Enjoy England as performing better than ever before. Enjoy England assessed 322 TICs in England in 2010. We were rated 17th overall - and 3rd



in Wiltshire's 18, behind Salisbury and Swindon.

The shoppers had telephoned, e-mailed and actually visited the Centre, rating it on its speed of response, the warmth of its welcome, the degree of local knowledge exhibited by its staff and their eagerness to promote the area to their visitors. Now that really is service. Thank you team!

As well as books, maps and souvenirs relating to Corsham, the Centre books local accommodation. Taken together with evening meals, this is conservatively estimated to put over £20,000 directly into the local economy.

CARDS FOR GOOD CAUSES RETURN

harity Christmas cards have been around for a while but Corsham shoppers have always made a special effort to raise funds for a wide range of charities, including Dorothy House and Wiltshire Air Ambulance.

Last year the Centre returned a record of over £11,000 to the charities and is hoping to increase this to £12,000 in 2010.



Unlike some charity cards, the Cards for Good Causes range guarantees to return at least 75 pence out of each pound spent to the charities represented. The 2010 range of cards covering 33 charities went on sale at the start of October and our volunteers are offering extra time to help out over the next two months.

"There is a lot of support from the public and obviously people have their own favourite ones. The support for the Wiltshire Air Ambulance was very high last Christmas, so we have increased the display of their cards. Last year, people were slow to buy cards because of the postal strikes but it picked up nearer Christmas. This year the early shoppers will get the best choice." said Cheryl, one of our two part-time managers at the Centre.

100,000TH VISITOR

e had the pleasure of welcoming our 100,000th visitor to the Centre in September. Mr Wim Slager and his wife Annemie, from Winterswijk in Holland (right, with CADT Director Ian Storey), found this out to their surprise when they visited Corsham the day before our 10th Anniversary celebration.

Besides being presented with a certificate as special visitors, the couple were also given

free admission to Corsham Court by the owner Mr James Methuen-Campbell.

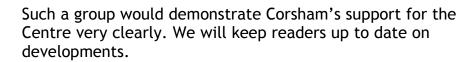
Prices are very reasonable. Our staff can guide you to the most cost-effective ones - Friday is a day best avoided. Concessions are available. By way of example, a day return to Swindon can cost as little as £6.40 per adult (£3.30 if 60+). A day return to Bristol can cost as little as £6.00 per adult (£3.00 if 60+). The pick up point for all trips is the bus stop in Pickwick, on the main A4, near the Two Pigs.

National Express represents a truly convenient mode of travel. You avoid car parking fees. Journey times are short because pick up points are few.
